ABOUT LA MAMA

La Mama is a not for profit, independent theatre with a distinct artist focus. Treasured for its continued advocacy of those seeking to explore beyond the mainstream theatre, La Mama champions artistic freedom and individuality. Providing the integral foundational resources and support for new and experienced theatre makers, La Mama ensures artist remuneration, celebrates creative risk and pedestals the development of new vibrant work.

La Mama prioritises accessibility and celebrates its excitingly diverse community, warmly welcoming artists and audiences alike from a wide cross section of the community. With its rich history spanning over fifty years, La Mama stimulates work that is adventurous, vigorous, relevant and reflective of a vital range of needs and voices.

La Mama has operated out of our home at 205 Faraday Street since 1967. In 1998 we took over management of La Mama Courthouse in Drummond Street, which we gratefully rent through Working Heritage. Through a major fundraising effort in 2008, the La Mama community bought the Faraday Street site. Sadly on May 19, 2018, just short of our 10th year anniversary, the building on Faraday Street burned down. Our intention is to restore our beloved La Mama to its humble, intimate self, honouring our rich past and preparing for a fruitful future. The size of the performance space will not change and we are aspiring to recreate its mood, simplicity and magic. Despite the tragedy of the fire, there is a significant opportunity for La Mama to make some adjustments and improvements – one very clear example is that we will be able to realise our long-held ambition to make La Mama an accessible space; which delights us greatly. We're in the process of dreaming, reflecting and considering all these possibilities and will continue to do this over the coming months.

La Mama is home to many and open to all. We hope to see you there.

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WELCOME

Welcome to our Summer and Autumn Seasons for 2019.

We at La Mama are deeply grateful to the support and leadership from Creative Victoria and the Minister Martin Foley allocating \$1 million to assist us in our La Mama rebuild. With the insurance payment from QBE this will go a good way to helping bring our dreams for the new/old La Mama at 205 Faraday Street to fruition.

We aspire at this point to commence the rebuild by the middle of 2019 and will be actively fundraising between now and then with a public campaign launch in early May.

The La Mama rebuild will be our focus for the next two years and will be a carefully managed process honouring the past and dreaming for the future. We will keep alive the spirit of La Mama, its simplicity and modesty while making a viable theatrical home for generations to come.

For the next two years we will be largely operating from the La Mama Courthouse. Our temporary offices are there and

our mainstage performances, plus Poetica, Musica and Playreadings will be programmed there.

Our postponed 2018 EXPLORATION SEASON has now been reprogrammed for May – June 2019 by Caitlin and will take place at The Burrow in Fitzroy and details for this will be launched in April.

Thanks to all of you who have donated money, messaged support and offered other forms of assistance in our hour of need. We very much appreciate your love and look forward to seeing a lot of you in the coming year.

UNCLE VANYA

Chekhov quaintly but pointedly dubbed Uncle Vanya "A Portrait of Country Life in Four Acts." Anything but bucolic, his tragic but funny/awful masterpiece deals honestly with isolation, economic uncertainty, tensions around property inheritance, depression, resilience, and family bonds.

Sounds pretty contemporary? How about "Forests are disappearing, rivers are running dry... the climate is ruined..." This nineteenth century Russian writer's themes are becoming more urgent by the minute.

But this version goes much further. For a start, it's performed in real time over two days. On a real country estate. In this case, Hans Heysen's magnificent historic home The Cedars, near Hahndorf. A small audience of 40 people per performance enters the world of the play as it unfolds

within the rooms of the house and spills into the surrounding landscape. Between acts, the audience hear about the history of the property and the ecology of the area, and interact with the characters, who go about their lives, seamlessly continuing both 'in' and 'out' of performance.

Conceived by director Bagryana Popov, produced with La Mama and supported by La Trobe University, this unique event has been performed in regional locations in Victoria and NSW. Those who have experienced it have found it deeply moving.

Uncle Vanya has been generously supported by La Trobe University through its Disciplinary Research Program in English, Theatre and Drama and Research Focus Area Transforming Human Societies, Creative Victoria, Bundanon Trust, The Avoca Project and Lyndal Jones. We also thank the people at Corinella House and Steiglitz for hosting previous seasons, and Majid Shokor and Vince Crowley for their artistic contribution.


