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LA MAMA PRESENTS DEARIDA

Dance can give us hope, community and healing in a chaotic world.

Dear Ida is a performance that gives contemporary audiences a unique insight into the pivotal role that WWII dancehalls played in maintaining cohesion and healing on the Australian homefront. For many, the dances were everything. The dances were euphoric, a lifeline, a place of beauty and excitement in a world of constant turbulence. At the dances you could lose yourself in sensual pleasures and escape the tensions and grief brought by war. Weaving stories of service people and civilians together, Dear Ida provides an opportunity to understand the profound healing impact of dance in a time of trauma. This story has new found relevance in modern society.

Director Lisa Petty says:

"While the stories of the dancehalls are set in the landscape of WWII the themes within Dear Ida are universal and especially relevant today. As the world heals from two years of turbulence, the importance of places where the community could regularly meet and share fun, laughter, physical and sensual connection has never been clearer."

Throughout the creative development of this work, Lisa Petty interviewed many men and women throughout Australia who lived on the WWII home-front. For these people the dancehall experiences remained a constant luminous memory. The memory was often one of euphoria, unity, and...fun! It is these stories that formed the basis of Dear Ida.

Past production:

Dear Ida was previously performed as part of a master's thesis production and performed at Glen Eira Town Hall - a major WWII dance venue.

The stories and images within Dear Ida resonated not only with those who lived on the Australian WWII home-front but also with their children. Many audience members spoke of their parents meeting at dances or remembered their mother or father dancing in the kitchen. For others, Dear Ida provided insight into the lives of elders who had previously remained silent about their wartime experience.
